#### Children's 1300 Codex project

Last year some our children in Year 5 and 6 took part in a very special project. The project was called Codex 1300. The story of the Codex starts 1,342 years ago when Benedict Biscop first created a monastery on the banks of the River Wear at Wearmouth. This monastery became a place of great learning as the Bishop carried wonderful books back from Rome. A few years after Wearmouth monastery was finished, Benedict Biscop built a second in Jarrow. He asked a man called Ceolfrith to be the Abbot or leader of both monasteries. On a return visit from Rome Benedict Biscop showed a copy of the Bible to Ceolfrith who then decided that the monks should make a copy. The original copy was written in Latin which is the language used for prayers. Three books were created and on the 4<sup>th</sup> June 716AD exactly 1300 years ago Abbot Ceolfrith left Wearmouth monastery with 80 other monks and walked to Rome to give a special copy to the Pope. The book the monks originally copied from has been lost, but the book (or Codex) written in Wearmouth and Jarrow is still safe in the library in Italy.

1300 years passed from 716 AD to 2016 AD and it was decided that a new version of the bible (or Codex) be written to give to the Pope to remember the work of the monks all those years ago. 140 schools in the Sunderland area agreed they would help re-write this special bible (Children's Codex) and our school had the special honour of being one of those schools. Children from nurseries to secondary schools took part and on the 4<sup>th</sup> June 2016 the Children's Codex left St. Peter's Church to start its journey to Rome. Whilst on its way the Archbishop of Canterbury heard about the Children's Codex and requested a look at the special book. The Archbishop was very impressed and signed the codex and it then continued its journey to Rome where it was then presented to the Pope. We are really proud of our school taking part in such a historic event and we look forward in receiving our very own copy of the Children's Codex to keep in school.
